AD/CVD Cases on Imports from China

Before and After the Trade Cases

Comparing the state of the domestic industry before and after the trade cases were filed against China shows that the trade cases rescued the domestic industry from an all-but-certain demise.

USITC Final Determination

Volume of Chinese Imports

- •Increased from '16-'18. The volume of imports of cabinets, vanities, and components from China increased from \$1.0 billion in 2016 to \$1.3 billion in 2017 and \$1.6 billion in 2018, or by 53.8 percent.
- •Increased More Than Demand. Subject import volumes increased more than apparent U.S. consumption, resulting in increased market share for subject imports over the period of investigation (POI).

USITC Final Determination

Price Effects


- Significant Underselling. Chinese imports undersold the domestic like product in 115 of 120 quarterly price comparisons.
- •Significant Price Suppression. The domestic industry was unable to increase prices sufficiently for wooden cabinets and vanities to cover its rising costs during a period of increasing demand. Chinese imports prevented price increases for the domestic like product, which otherwise would have occurred.

USITC Final Determination

Impact on the Domestic Industry


- •Lost Market Share. Increases in the domestic industry's shipments by value each year of the POI were at a lower rate than increases in apparent U.S. consumption, which resulted in a decline in the domestic industry's market share.
- •Declining Performance. While the domestic industry's production and financial performance were generally steady between 2016 and 2017, it experienced declines in performance in 2018.
- Wages and Workers. The number of production-related workers ("PRWs"), total hours worked, and wages paid increased between 2016 and 2018 but were lower in interim 2019.

Impact of Trade Cases





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AD/CVD Orders Sparked Investment in the Domestic Industry

The imposition of AD/CVD duties set the stage for massive investments in new production capacity and upgrades to existing production facilities for cabinets in the United States.



The Battle Continues

The Chinese producers continue to attack the U.S. market through the following maneuvers:

- 1. Appeals in the court system;
- 2. Administrative reviews of the AD/CVD rates
- 3. Requests for scope rulings
- 4. Evasion tactics such as transshipment
- Circumvention through finishing operations in third countries

Court Appeals

Court Appeals

- •Dalian Meisen (CIT No. 10-109). Challenged the application of total adverse facts available to calculate its dumping margin.
- The Ancientree (CIT No. 10-114). Challenged the manner in which DOC calculated the dumping margins in the antidumping investigation.
- •Dalian Meisen (CIT No. 10-110). Challenges the manner in which DOC calculated the subsidy rates for in the countervailing duty investigation.



Court Appeals Status

- Original Investigations: We are still on track for victory in all three cases challenging Commerce's final affirmative determinations.
- **NEW CASE: Dalian Hualing v. US**: Dalian Hualing is challenging Commerce's assignment of a China-wide rate of 251.64% in the first antidumping administrative review.

Administrative Reviews

Administrative Reviews

- When requested, Commerce must <u>review</u> and <u>recalculate</u> the AD/CVD rates of a foreign producer once every year.
- The new AD/CVD rates are based on <u>new sales and cost information</u> for imports that took place during the annual review period.



Administrative Reviews

- •The newly calculated AD/CVD rates apply both:
 - Retrospectively to past imports made over the annual review period; and
 - **Prospectively** as cash deposit rates for **future** imports.



Subsidies Reviews

- •<u>First Review</u> On August 19, 2022, Commerce issued final results of 2019-2020 review review covering four Chinese companies. Rates remained largely unchanged.
- •<u>Second Review</u> On May 1, 2023, Commerce issued the preliminary results of the 2021 review covering 10 Chinese companies. The new CVD rates ranged from 7.47% to 14.60%
- •<u>Third Review</u> On June 12, 2023, Commerce initiated the third review for 43 companies.

Dumping Reviews

- •<u>First Review</u> On November 2, 2022, Commerce issued final results of 2019-2021 review, resulting in *high rates* for four Chinese companies but *zero rates* for 16 companies.
- •<u>Second Review</u> On May 1, 2023, Commerce issued the preliminary results of the 2021-2022 review. The AD rates ranged from **7.71% to 43.00%**.
- •<u>Third Review</u> On June 12, 2023, Commerce initiated the third review for **69** companies.

Scope Rulings

Need to Fight Scope Ruling Requests

- The "scope" of the AD/CVD orders defines which wooden cabinets, vanities, and components thereof are subject to the AD/CVD duties.
- Chinese producers and U.S. importers are constantly looking for ambiguity or loopholes in the scope of the orders that they can exploit to resume shipping Chinese cabinets to the United States.
- It is critical to fight these efforts by participating in scope inquiries initiated by the Commerce Department to resolve these questions with the scope.

Scope Rulings: Phragmite Cabinets



- •On February 23, 2023, Nanjing Kaylang Co., Ltd. ("Kaylang") a Chinese producer of Cabinets and Vanities made from phragmites, submitted a scope ruling request seeking to confirm that Cabinets and Vanities made from Phragmites are not subject to the Antidumping and Countervailing Duty orders on Wooden Cabinets and Vanities from the People's Republic of China.
- •On March 28, 2023, Commerce accepted Kaylang's request and initiated a formal scope inquiry.
- •On April 27, 2023, we filed a response in opposition to Kaylang's request.

How Are Phragmites Used to Make Cabinets?

- Dried pieces of phragmites are mixed with glue and compressed to form a board like MDF.
- The board is then coated with melamine to form the pieces used to make the cabinets and vanities.



Are They Covered by the Scope?

Kaylang:

- The scope of the orders only covers "wooden" cabinets and vanities and components.
- Cabinets made from phragmites are not wooden and thus are not covered.

KCMA Position:

- The scope covers cabinets and vanities that are made from engineered woods like particle board and MDF.
- Boards made from phragmites would be classified as particleboard or MDF.
- Cabinets made from phragmite boards are "wooden" as defined by the scope and therefore are covered by the scope of the orders.






Country-Wide Scope / Circumvention Inquiries

Background

- •On April 22, 2022, the AKCA filed requests that Commerce initiate scope inquiries and circumvention inquiries and determine that certain imports of wooden cabinets and vanities and components thereof ("WCV") from Malaysia and Vietnam are covered by the AD/CVD orders on WCV from China.
- •The requests target imports of WCV comprised of a mix of finished and unfinished components and parts that originate from China and components that originate from Malaysia or Vietnam.

Scenarios Covered

Scenarios Covered: What's Coming from China?

- <u>Combining:</u> A Malaysian company imports <u>finished Chinese components</u>, combines them with Malaysian components, and then ships the final product to the United States.
- <u>Finishing:</u> A Malaysian company imports <u>semifinished Chinese components</u>, performs further processing of these components in Malaysia, combines the finished Chinese components with Malaysian components, and then ships the final product to the United States.
- <u>Parts:</u> A Malaysian company imports Chinese parts of components (*e.g.*, rails, stiles, panels), assembles the parts into components, combines the finished components with Malaysian components, and then ships the final product to the United States.

Preliminary Results of Scope Inquiry

- •On March 17, 2023, Commerce issued the preliminary results of the scope inquiries.
 - The scope **covers** finished wooden doors, drawer faces, and frames produced in China that have been combined in Malaysia or Vietnam with wooden cabinet boxes and drawer boxes started and finished in those countries.
 - There was insufficient information to determine whether the scope covers semifinished components and parts of components produced in China and combined with cabinet boxes and drawer boxes in Malaysia or Vietnam.
 - The scope does not cover finished wooden toe kicks produced in China are combined in Malaysia or Vietnam with all other components necessary to build a complete wooden cabinet which were started and finished in Malaysia or Vietnam.

Four Scenarios

- •Scenario 1: <u>finished</u> doors, drawer faces, and frames produced in China are combined in Malaysia/Vietnam with cabinet boxes and drawer boxes started and finished in Malaysia/Vietnam.
- •Scenario 2: <u>semifinished</u> doors, drawer faces, and frames produced in China are further processed in Malaysia/Vietnam and then combined with cabinet boxes and drawer boxes produced in Malaysia/Vietnam.
- •Scenario 3: semifinished <u>parts</u> of cabinet and vanity doors, drawer faces, and frames (all the rails, stiles, and panels) are produced in China and are further processed in Malaysia/Vietnam and then combined with wooden cabinet boxes and drawer boxes produced in Malaysia/Vietnam.
- •Scenario 4: finished wooden <u>toe kicks</u> produced in China are combined in Malaysia/Vietnam with all other components necessary to build a complete wooden cabinet which were started and finished in Malaysia/Vietnam.
